Endowment funds provide the annual income that supports scientific research done by SDE/GWIS awardees. Grants will be made to women holding a degree from a recognized institution of higher learning, of outstanding ability and promise in research, who are performing hypothesis-driven research.

Grants for Research on Prevention of Violence Against Children

Funding Source: Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

Deadline: January 15, 2016 Letter of Intent; March 01, 2016 Full Proposal

Grants of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's National Center for Injury Prevention and Control (NCIPC) support investigator-initiated research that will help expand and advance our understanding of how best to disseminate, implement, and translate evidence-based primary prevention strategies, programs, and policies designed to reduce child abuse and neglect. NCIPC is also soliciting investigator-initiated research to expand our knowledge about what works to prevent violence by rigorously evaluating primary prevention strategies, programs, and policies, to address specific gaps in the prevention of injury caused by child abuse and neglect, teen dating violence, intimate partner violence, and sexual violence. This initiative is intended to support primary prevention strategies, programs or policies that target universal or selected high-risk populations (i.e., populations that have one or more risk factors that place them at heightened risk for initial perpetration of violence). Funds are available for research in the areas of child abuse and neglect, teen dating violence, intimate partner violence, and sexual violence as detailed elsewhere in this document.

Grants for Reducing Health Disparities Among Minority and Underserved Children

Funding Source: National Institutes of Health

Deadlines: February 5, 2016; June 05, 2016; and, October 05, 2016

Grants support research that targets the reduction of health disparities among children. "Health disparities" applies to children who have limited access to resources and privileges that impact their health. As such, this initiative includes a focus on ethnic and racial minority children and populations of underserved children to include: children from low literacy, rural and low-income populations, geographically isolated children, hearing and visually impaired children,

physically or mentally disabled children, children of migrant workers, children from immigrant and refugee families, and language minority children. Rather than a singular approach, interventions using a multilevel approach (individual, health system, community, societal) are encouraged. Specific targeted areas of research include biobehavioral studies that incorporate multiple factors that influence child health disparities such as biological (e.g., genetics, cellular, organ systems), lifestyle factors, environmental (e.g., physical and family environments) social (e.g., peers), economic, institutional, and cultural and family influences; studies that target the specific health promotion needs of children with a known health condition and/or disability; and studies that test and evaluate the comparative effectiveness of health promotion interventions conducted in traditional and nontraditional settings. Although this funding opportunity uses the R01 grant mechanism, it runs in parallel with a program announcement of identical scientific scope, PA-14-034, which uses the exploratory/developmental (R21) grant mechanism.

Grants for Education, Workforce Preparation and Other Areas

Deadline: February 15, 2016 and August 15, 2016 for Rhode Island

Grants fund Rhode Island and Southeastern Massachusetts nonprofits for programs with a focus on education. Other major giving categories that are supported are human welfare, civic affairs and arts and culture. Priority is given to programs that serve underrepresented and low socio-economic populations.

Grants for Projects on Preservation and Use of Valuable Archival Resources

Funding Source: National Archives and Records Administration

Deadline: April 04, 2016 Draft (optional); June 15, 2016 Proposal

Grants through the National Historical Publications and Records Commission fund projects that promote the preservation and use of the nation's most valuable archival resources. This grant program is designed to support archival repositories in preserving and processing primary source materials. The program emphasizes the creation of online tools that facilitate the public discovery of historical records. The Commission looks to fund projects that undertake one or more of the following activities

- Preservation, arrangement, and online description of historical records in all formats
- Digital preservation of electronic records and unstable audio and visual formats

After completing arrangement and description activities, applicants may also propose to digitize materials to provide online access to collections.
