Registration for degree candidates begins on October 26, 2010. Registration instructions and times may be found on the College web site through RICConnect. You can register only at or after the date and time you are given for registration. For spring registration, you may register any time from that date and time until Friday, December 18, 2009. **Registering for classes at the time assigned to you assures that you have the best selection of classes.**

**To access RICConnect for registration**

1. Go to [www.ric.edu](http://www.ric.edu)
2. Click on **Online Services** in the upper right hand portion of the screen
3. Click on **For Students and Faculty**

- Use your user ID and password to access your personal account
- Your user ID and password are case sensitive; enter your user ID in lower case
- Your user ID is the first letter of your first name, followed by your last name, then an underscore ( \_ ), and the last four digits of your student ID. You can find this printed on the address label of the college spring bulletin when you receive it.
- For most students, your password is the first three letters of the month in which you were born, entered in lowercase, two digits for the day you were born, and the last four digits of your Social Security number. The college substitutes jan01 for birth month and day if it does not have this information about you. If it does not have your Social Security number, it substitutes the last four digits of you student ID.

#### 4. Click on **Self Service**

- Students should see several options – enrollment, campus finances, personal information, academic records, degree progress, transfer credit, and involvement
- Select enrollment and proceed through the enrollment process

### **Schedule of Courses**

You will receive the Rhode Island College Bulletin through the mail. The bulletin contains material and information for registration. Make sure you read it carefully. Some courses and sections are missing from the bulletin or have changed. We are attaching instructions and the most current schedule. Please consult our documents as you register for courses for spring 2009.

This year we are offering three courses in the Early Spring Semester, which begins in mid-December and ends in mid-January. Although offered in a format that is different from our ongoing program, these courses are included and billed as part of students' spring 2010 selections.

#### **SWRK 553 School Social Work**

4:00 - 8.00pm (December 14, 15, 21, 22, January 4, 5, 11, 12) and January 16 (9:00 – 1.00 p.m.)

Students will examine the roles and responsibilities of social workers in school settings and explore the ways in which schools constitute unique environments for social work practice.

#### **SWRK 626 Theory and Practice of Social Work with Groups**

9:00am-3:30pm (January 19, 21, 23 In Person; Continues Online)

Students will explore group process using several types of groups and examine related theories, leadership, structure, participants, as well as ethics and behavioral issues.

#### **SWRK 636 Differential Diagnosis in Clinical Social Work**

9.00am-3.30pm (December 14, 16, 17 In Person; Continues Online)

This course will explore differentially diagnosing individuals across mental health settings using multiple methods of assessment. Emphasis will be placed on developing advanced clinical skills in interviewing using specific assessment techniques and tools while accounting for and appreciating variances in culture, ethnicity and other areas of client diversity.

### **Dates to Remember**

- Registration for spring 2010 classes begins October 26, 2008
- Field internships resume for spring semester on January 4, 2010
- Classes in the regular spring semester begin Tuesday, January 25, 2010

### **Graduation Requirements**

Students who expect to graduate in May or August 2010 should apply for graduation by going online to RIconnect. The graduation site will be active late in January and we will send another reminder. Students who have all requirements met but have electives to take in summer 2010 can participate in May graduation ceremonies, but will not receive a diploma.

Advanced Standing students need a total of 32 credits to graduate. All other students must have 61 credits to graduate.

We will begin auditing your academic record early in January to assure that you have the courses you need to graduate.

### **Academic Advisement**

If you need any assistance in planning for spring enrollment or thinking about your courses in general, please contact your field advisor who serves as your academic advisor. ### **Payment of Tuition and Fees**

The Bursar's Office will send you a bill for the spring semester on or about December 1<sup>st</sup> 2009. Payment must be made before January 4, 2010. If payment or other arrangements are not made by the due date, your registration will be canceled. We do not initiate the cancellation of registration and we do not have control over saving your space. However, if your registration is canceled, you will not be guaranteed a spot in sections you have chosen. If a space becomes available in a class, any other student can register for that space in the online system. When your bill is paid, you will have to go into a section that is available. If you have a problem paying the bill by the due date, please contact the Bursar's office (401-456-8130) and make some alternative arrangements. If you have a prior outstanding balance due the College, your registration may not be processed until the outstanding bill is paid.

1. If payment of your bill is dependent upon receipt of a bank loan, provide a letter for the

Bursar's office from the bank indicating that your loan is being processed.

2. NEBHE student – If you are a student who resides in a New England state that does not offer the MSW in a public college/university, you are eligible for the regional tuition (the in-state tuition plus 50%). To take advantage of this tuition rate, you must complete the appropriate form which can be obtained from the Records Office (Call 401-456-8212).

## Full-Time First-Year Students

**General instructions:** All full-time students should enroll in 1) Field Instruction II; 2) HBDO II\*; 3) Generalist Foundations & Skills: Policy & Organizing II; 4) Generalist Foundations & Skills: Direct Practice II; and 5) Social Work Research and Evaluation II.

From the registration material included in your packet, select a section from each of the following groups:

1. **Field Instruction:** All students must register for **Field Instruction II** (SWRK 501 - 3 credits). You need to continue in the section you currently attend.\*\*
2. **Human Behavior, Diversity and Oppression II** (SWRK 522 - 3 credits): Select one section.
3. **Generalist Foundations & Skills: Policy & Organizing II** (SWRK 531 - 3 credits): Select one section.
4. **Generalist Foundation & Skills: Direct Practice II** (SWRK 533 - 3 credits): Select one section.
5. **Social Work Research and Evaluation II** (SWRK 542 - 2 credits): Select one section.

**We are preparing to make changes to the curriculum that will affect the number of free electives you can take. If you already have taken six credits in electives, please do not take any more electives until you meet with your advisor. If you have tested out of SW 541, the research course, you can take an elective to substitute for those three credits.**

\*If you have taken HBDO II as a non-matriculated student, you may take an elective. First-year students can take SWRK 516 (Social Work and the Law), SWRK 539 (Child Welfare Practice), or SWRK 553 offered in the early spring semester (School Social Work), or a 500-level or 600-level course outside the program. If you wish to take a course outside the program, you must have the approval of the chair of the MSW program. All other electives in the program are 600 level electives for which you do not have the prerequisite. Please find in this packet information on electives that are offered by other departments on campus.

## Full-Time or Advanced Standing Second-Year Students

**General Instructions:** The normal load is: 1) field instruction and field seminar; 2) one of the three clinical practice courses; *or* the administration practice course; *or* the policy/organizing practice course (Dual Concentration students take two of these three courses); 3) Integrative Project; and 4) two free electives or one free elective and a concentration elective course for single concentration students (dual concentration students should select one concentration elective course from each concentration).

To be considered full time, students must take Field Instruction and three courses at a minimum. All students, except Advanced Standing students, need a total of 61 credits to graduate. Advanced Standing students need a total of 32 credits to graduate. If you have questions please speak to your advisor or contact Jay Nimmagadda (MSW Program Chair).

You will need to register for the following courses:

1. **SWRK 601: Field Instruction and Field Seminar IV** (4 credits) **Note: You need to continue in the section you currently attend.** (Please consult the course schedule included with these materials for the correct seminar times.)
2. Concentration Course
  - A. If you are in the Clinical concentration: register for a section of **Clinical Practice II: Children and Families (SWRK 603 – 3 credits)** *or* **Clinical Practice II: Adults and Families (SWRK 605 – 3 credits)** *or* **Clinical Practice II: Older Adults and Families (SWRK 607 – 3 credits)**.
  - B. If you are in the Administration concentration: register for **SWRK 613: Program Planning & Development (3 credits)**. Please note that this course will be taught as a hybrid course. Students will meet monthly in person. The remainder of this course will be offered online.
  - C. If you are in the Policy/Organizing concentration, register for **SWRK 615: Leadership for Progressive Change (3 credits)**.
  - D. If you are in a Dual concentration: register for a practice course in each of your two concentrations: If one of your two concentrations is clinical, select one of the following: **Clinical Practice II: Children and Families (SWRK 603 – 3 credits)** *or* **Clinical Practice II: Adults and Families (SWRK 605 – 3 credits)**, *or* **Older Adults and Families (SWRK 607 – 3 credits)**. If one of your two concentrations is clinical, also select *either* **Program Planning and Development (SWRK 613 – 3 credits)** *or* **Leadership for Progressive Change (SWRK 615 – 3 credits)** as your second concentration. **Dual concentration students who do not select a clinical concentration should register for both Program Planning and Development (SWRK**

**613 – 3 credits) and Leadership for Progressive Change (SWRK 615 – 3 credits).**

3. Register for a section of **SWRK 643: Integrative Project** (3 credits). **You need to continue in the section you currently attend.**
4. Concentration elective:
  - A. Students in the Clinical Concentration must register for a Clinical concentration elective if they have not already taken it. (Check enclosed materials describing the concentration elective choices.)
  - B. Students in the Administration concentration must register for an Administration concentration elective if they have not already taken it. (Check enclosed materials describing the concentration elective choices.)
  - C. Students in the Policy/Organizing concentration must register for a Policy/Organizing concentration elective if they have not already taken it. (Check enclosed materials describing the concentration elective choices.)
  - D. Students in the Dual Concentration must complete a concentration elective in *each* concentration. If you have not done so, register for the concentration elective(s). (Check enclosed materials describing the concentration elective choices.)
5. Free electives:
  - A. Students in a single concentration (Clinical, Administration, or Policy/Organizing) must take a total of three 3-credit electives. These can be taken from any of the elective courses offered for which you have the prerequisite. You may also use additional concentration electives in your concentration to meet your elective requirements, space permitting. Students needing these concentration electives to meet graduation requirements will be given priority in these courses. Other courses in your approved Plan of Study may also be taken for elective credit.
  - B. Students who are in a Dual Concentration do not take free electives.

## Part-Time Students

- A. Part-time students who are going into the second semester of their first year of the program should register for SWRK 522: Human Behavior, Diversity & Oppression II (3 credits) and SWRK 542: Social Work Research and Evaluation II (2 credits) for a total of 5 credits.

**We are preparing to make changes to the curriculum that will affect the number of electives you can take. If you already have taken six credits in electives, please do not take any more electives until you meet with your advisor. If you have tested out of SW 541, the research course, you can take an elective to substitute for those three credits.**

- B. Part-time students who are in the second year in the MSW program should register for Field and the two practice courses. Register for:
1. A section of **Field Instruction II** (SWRK 501 – 3 credits). This is a 16-hour per week field placement for the academic year. In addition, there is a two-hour field seminar which meets once per month. The day and time listed in the schedule are for the seminar. Students need to stay in the section which they currently attend.
  2. A section of **Generalist Foundations & Skills: Policy and Organizing II** (SWRK 531 – 3 credits).
  3. A section of **Generalist Foundations & Skills: Direct Practice II** (SWRK 533 – 3 credits).

**We are preparing to make changes to the curriculum that will affect the number of electives you can take. If you already have taken six credits in electives, please do not take any more electives until you meet with your advisor. If you have tested out of SW 541, the research course, you can take an elective to substitute for those three credits.**

- C. Part-time students who are in their third year (and in a second-year field placement) should register for Field, the second concentration practice course (either Clinical, Administration, or Policy/Organizing), and either the second Integrative Project course or an elective, depending on registration during the first semester. Dual Concentration students take the concentration practice courses for their selected concentrations. Register for:
1. A section of **Field Instruction IV** (SWRK 601 – 4 credits). This is a 20-hour per week field placement for the academic year. In addition, there is a two-hour seminar that meets once a month. The times and days listed in the schedule are for the seminar. Students need to stay in the section which they currently attend.
  2. Clinical concentration students: A section of **Clinical Practice II: Children and Families** (SWRK603 – 3 credits) *or* **Clinical Practice II: Adults and Families** (SWRK 605 – 3 credits) *or* **Clinical Practice II: Older Adults and Families** (SWRK 607 – 3

credits).

3. Administration concentration students: **Program Planning and Development (SWRK 613 – 3 credits)**. Please note that this course will be taught as a hybrid course. There will be a monthly in-person meeting, with the remainder of the course online.
  4. Policy/Organizing students: **Leadership for Progressive Change (SWRK 615 – 3 credits)**.
  5. Dual Concentration students register for a practice course in each of their two concentrations. If one of the two concentrations is clinical, select one of the following: **Clinical Practice II: Children and Families (SWRK 603 – 3 credits) or Clinical Practice II: Adults and Families (SWRK 605 – 3 credits) or Clinical Practice II: Older Adults and Families (SWRK 607 – 3 credits)**. If one of the two concentrations is clinical, also select either **Program Planning and Development (SWRK 613 – 3 credits) or Leadership for Progressive Change (SWRK 615 – 3 credits)** as your second concentration. Dual Concentration students who do not select a clinical concentration should register for both **Program Planning and Development (SWRK 613 – 3 credits) and Leadership for Progressive Change (SWRK 615 – 3 credits)**.
  6. Single concentration students should register for the section of **Integrative Project (SWRK 643 – 3 credits)** which they currently attend. Students enrolled in Integrative Project during the fall semester must continue with this course in the spring semester in the same section in which they are currently enrolled.
- D. Part-time students in their fourth year, last semester should check with their advisor regarding their remaining two courses. Single-concentration students typically register for their remaining electives. Dual Concentration students typically register for the Integrative Project (SWRK 643 – 3 credits) and any remaining concentration electives.

1. Electives available to first and second year students (**NOTE: Dual Concentration students do not take free electives**):

SWRK 535: Crisis Intervention and Brief Treatment

SWRK 539: Child Welfare Practice

SWRK 553: School Social Work (offered in early spring semester)

2. Concentration electives open to concentration year or advanced students:

\*This is an Administration and Policy/Organizing concentration elective. It is taught as a hybrid class (part in class and part on-line). This course may be taken as a free elective only if space allows.

SWRK 630: Family Practice – Social Work Models\*

\*This is a clinical concentration course. This course may be taken as a free elective only if space allows.

SWRK 635: Social Work Practice with Trauma Clients\*

\*This is a clinical concentration course. This course may be taken as a free elective only if space allows.

3. Free electives – open to concentration year/advanced students only

SWRK613: Program Planning and Development (this is a hybrid class: part in class and part online course)

SWRK615: Leadership for Progressive Change

SWRK626: Theory and Practice of Social Work with Groups (offered in the early spring semester)

SWRK 636: Differential Diagnosis in Clinical Social Work (offered in early spring semester)

## Required Concentration Elective

**Clinical Concentration** - If you are in the Clinical concentration, you must take a total of three required courses: 1) **Clinical Practice II: Children and Families (SWRK602 – 3 credits) or Clinical Practice II: Adults and Families (SWRK 604 – 3 credits) or Clinical Practice II: Older Adults and Families (SWRK 606 – 3 credits)** in the fall semester; 2) **Clinical Practice II: Children and Families (SWRK603 – 3 credits) or Clinical Practice II: Adults and Families (SWRK 605 – 3 credits) or Clinical Practice II: Older Adults and Families (SWRK 607 – 3 credits)** in the spring semester, and 3) a clinical concentration elective. If you have not yet taken the required clinical concentration elective, you need to do so in the spring semester. The following spring semester courses will satisfy this third clinical course requirement:

- SWRK 630: Family Practice: Social Work Models
- SWRK 635: Social Work Practice with Trauma Clients
- SWRK 626: Theory and Practice of Social Work with Groups
- SWRK 636: Differential Diagnosis in Clinical Social Work
- 

**Social Work Administration Concentration** - If you are in the Administration concentration, you must take a total of three required courses: 1) SWRK 612: Leadership and Management in the fall semester, 2) SWRK 613: Program Planning & Development in the spring semester, and 3) a concentration elective. If you have not yet taken the required concentration elective, you need to take it in the spring. The following spring courses will satisfy this third course requirement:

- SWRK 620: Supervision in Social Work (this is a hybrid course – part in class and part online)
- SWRK 615: Leadership for Progressive Change

**Social Work Policy and Organizing Concentration** - If you are in the Policy and Organizing concentration, you must take a total of three required courses: 1) SWRK 614: Advanced Policy Practice in the fall semester, 2) SWRK 615: Leadership for Progressive Change in the spring semester, and 3) a concentration elective. If you have not yet taken the required concentration elective, you need to take it in the spring. The following spring courses will satisfy this third course requirement (other options may be explored on an individual basis):

- SWRK 620: Supervision in Social Work (this is hybrid course – part in class and part online)
- SWRK 613: Program Planning and Development

**Dual Concentration** - If you are in a Dual Concentration, you will need to take the concentration elective for each concentration, if you have not already done so. You must choose a concentration elective from each of the concentrations in which you are enrolled. Check with your advisor if you are not sure. You do not take any "free" electives.
