The Office of Institutional Research and Planning (OIRP) of Rhode Island College is pleased to present the 2024-2025 Fact Book. This is the primary publication of our office, providing a comprehensive look back at the previous academic year.

There have been a number of changes at RIC in recent years, including changes in systems and data. The goal of this publication remains, but the form continues to adapt. Last year, we transitioned how tables were built and redesigned the Quick Facts section. This year, you may notice that the Admissions section provides data only for this academic year without past trends. The Office of Undergraduate Admissions has been updating their processes and codes to meet current operational needs. OIRP recognized that these necessary changes would make meaningfully combining past and present data impossible without a large number of caveats and extensive explanations. Therefore, we made the decision to present just the current year's data, and we will grow back up to the usual five-year trend over time.

Another change is that as of July 1, 2025, OIRP is moving from the President's Office to Academic Affairs. This change is occurring, in part, because of the announced retirement of Mr. Clark Greene, senior advisor to the president and chief of staff. OIRP wishes to recognize Clark for his many years of service to the state of Rhode Island and to this college. We thank him for his constant support of this office and his calm guidance over the years.




Enrollment by Full/Part Time Status 4,346













Chart 1.3 - First-time, Full-time by Geo-Distribution




Chart 1.4 - First-time, Full-time by Sex






Chart 1.5 - First-time Full-time Freshman Enrollment by Race/Ethnicity







Chart 2.4 - Class Level Composition of Resident Students



Chart 2.5 - Undergraduate Enrollment by Age




Chart 2.6 - Graduate Enrollment by Age



Chart 2.7 - Students of Color Enrollment by Career Level













Chart 4.3 - Graduation Rates of First-time, Full-time Cohort by Financial Awards







Information Technology Services

The Rhode Island College Information Technology Services (ITS) department provides the campus community information technology services, including student systems, wired and wireless networks, telephones, event management systems, cyber security systems, email, classroom and lab services, learning management systems, lecture capture, training and many other technology related services. Information Technology Services offers services for the campus administrative systems, information security and the college Help Center. The Help Center is a single point of contact for information and assistance with classroom, desktop, network and telephone technologies. The Help Center also provides audiovisual service and support for the campus.

Student Access computers are available in the Adams library for student use. The Adams Library also provides laptops and iPads for loan to Rhode Island College students. General public use computers are also located in the Adams library.

Rhode Island College has over 250 auditoriums, classrooms, seminar rooms and conference rooms equipped with technology. This technology allows instructors to present teaching material to the students in a variety of ways, many of the conference rooms and classrooms are equipped with microphones and cameras to make our rooms HyFlex capable.
